250,000 SUPPORTERS STATEWIDE AND NATIONWIDE READY TO ACT

Over the past four years, SCAN has become a powerful voice for children in the U.S. with staff and volunteer leaders in seven states – Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, New Hampshire, South Carolina, Tennessee and Washington – and a grassroots network of more than 250,000 supporters from every state in the nation. In 2017 alone, our supporters conducted over 230 visits to local, state and federal lawmakers' offices and delivered nearly 900,000 messages to elected officials on behalf of kids.

In 2018, we are targeting two new states where ECE policy is already moving and gubernatorial candidates have made early childhood a central part of their agenda: New Mexico and Rhode Island. By leading with electoral engagement in support of candidates who have clear ECE proposals as part of their campaigns, SCAN is raising awareness while simultaneously mobilizing the grassroots and building the government relations infrastructure necessary to change policies for the better.

As a candidate and, eventually, a member of Congress, it makes dollars and sense to support increasing access to high-quality ECE programs. Such programs save taxpayer money, alleviate the financial burden on working-class families, level the playing field for all children and help ensure that the American promise of equal opportunity remains alive and well. Let's look at the facts.

Early education – starting at birth and continuing until a child's first day of school – is a critical window for ensuring future academic achievement and overall well-being. But that window closes fast.

By age five, a child's brain is almost completely developed, yet only three out of five American children are enrolled in quality ECE programs that foster healthy brain development and give them an equal chance at success in school and life. At just two years old, kids from low-income families can be up to six months behind their wealthier peers in language development. Many never catch up. Disadvantaged children who don't participate in high-quality ECE programs are¹:

In contrast, there are strong social and economic benefits to high-quality ECE programs. For example, the Perry Preschool Program in Ypsilanti, Michigan demonstrated a social rate of return between seven and ten percent. Participants were tracked through a longitudinal study that spanned 40 years. More recently, preschool programs in Tulsa and Boston have shown significant gains ranging from a half to full year of added learning in literacy, language and math.

Research from Nobel Prize-winning economist Dr. James Heckman also shows the rate of return on investment in early childhood development for many children can be 13 percent per child, per year due to improved outcomes in education, health, sociability, economic productivity and reduced crime. ECE yields long-term gains for children and society as a whole but also provides immediate benefits to families today:

Although quality child care is prohibitively expensive for many lowand middle-income families, it's also the key for those families to reach a higher socioeconomic status. Robust investments in ECE at the local, state and federal levels benefit the child and family today and for generations to come.

Voters connect with ECE on a personal level. According to a national poll of likely voters in battleground states conducted by SCAN, 90 percent of respondents think ECE is critical to children's success. In addition, 63 percent of respondents answered that public education should start with preschool and be offered to all four-year-olds. That figure represents a majority of Republicans, of independents and of Democrats; it also represents a majority in each of the five swing states surveyed.

Given these results, SCAN believes that the question is not how to create more evidence-based programs, but rather how to scale what we already know is working. Our policy recommendations are focused on financing solutions to expand access to ECE. By identifying proven techniques for intervention, the number of kids receiving a quality start to life across the country can increase. These tools range from new models, such as pay-for-success financing, to expanding existing concepts like the child care tax credit, to dedicating new sources of revenue.

ECE is not just about education or health. At its root, ECE is fundamentally an economic issue on which our nation's future depends. As such, SCAN's toolbox is an economic approach – it's about development, and it's about scale. SCAN believes the federal government should incentivize what is most effective and politically viable for local and state partners. This is not a top-down approach, but rather a partnership modeled on the way America has built and sustained a strong economy over the years – through federal, state and local collaboration.

The next Congress has an opportunity to recognize the power of these tools and support the federal government in catalyzing new financing mechanisms. Children may only comprise a quarter of our population now, but they represent our entire future. Investments in our kids are the best ones we, as a country, can make. The fact that ECE is also a winning political issue that appeals to voters across the political spectrum is simply an added bonus.

It gives kids a strong foundation — not just to start kindergarten ready to learn, but also to succeed later in life. And the long-term benefits of early learning make preschool programs some of the smartest investments we can make."

Foreign policy matters often get less attention than domestic concerns during political campaigns. While voters connect with rhetoric about their kid's education or their child care needs, igniting the same level of passion for issues related to international aid requires useful facts. SCAN understands this reality. We stand ready to work side by side with you once you win your election and take up your seat in Congress.

U.S. leadership in addressing the needs of children around the world has never been more critical. Families – and children in particular – face escalating challenges, thus putting a premium on strong American leadership and increased demands on the International Affairs Budget, which accounts for only one percent of the federal budget. At a time of important progress for children around the world, many still face tough challenges.

More than ever, we must remember that the well-being of our nation is inextricably linked to creating a more stable and prosperous world, an outcome supported by these investments. Around 20 million people in places like Nigeria, Somalia, South Sudan and Yemen are threatened by famine-like conditions. Now is not the time to scale back engagement nor funding for critical programs that impact women and children around the world.

Maternal, newborn and child survival (MNCS) is a significant component of the U.S. foreign assistance agenda. This is an issue Americans feel a moral obligation to support, but they are often uninformed about what our government is doing to solve the problem. Most are unaware that the reduction in preventable deaths of children and their mothers around the globe is one of the greatest successes in international development in the last 25 years, and one that the U.S. contributed to significantly. Since 1990, the world has reduced mortality rates for children under age five by more than half and for mothers by nearly 45 percent. Increasing access to proven interventions, such as routine immunizations, clean birthing practices, safe drinking water, dietary supplements and breastfeeding has largely driven this success. 5.6 million children and 300,000 women die each year Newborn deaths constitute a significant portion of under-five deaths; approximately one million babies die on the very day they are born. Those at greatest risk come from marginalized groups such as girls and people living in poverty, more remote rural areas or urban slums. Ensuring a fair chance at a healthy start for all children and mothers is within our grasp, and the next Congress has the unique opportunity to do more to improve maternal and child survival.

The U.S. is a leader in the global effort to improve the lives of women and children, helping to build the capacity of other countries to care for their most vulnerable citizens. Continuing this longstanding moral leadership, the U.S. has committed to a global goal of ending preventable child and maternal deaths by 2030. This goal is achievable as long as programs are being used to maximum impact.

The bipartisan Reach Every Mother and Child Act of 2017 (S.1730/H.R.4022), in front of Congress right now, would enact key reforms necessary to ensure that U.S. maternal and child health programs are as effective as possible. These reforms include: requiring a U.S. government strategy for implementing high-impact solutions; establishing rigorous reporting requirements to enhance transparency and accountability; and, establishing a Child and Maternal Survival Coordinator to oversee such programs. Because the U.S. cannot do it alone, the bill would also encourage USAID to explore and implement innovative financing tools, such as payfor-success contracting, which can reduce risk to U.S. taxpayers and encourage new participants in global health activities.

The next Congress must support effective, compassionate federal policies that will help prevent needless suffering, strengthen families, encourage economic development and — most importantly — save lives. Our moral leadership and national security depend upon making these smart and targeted investments in the global community. SCAN stands ready to work with you to achieve a bipartisan breakthrough for kids come January 2019.

- **6. SUPPORTING THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA:** SCAN will provide tweets and posts on these issues and can also assist in coordinating a Twitter Town Hall or Google Hangout to connect in real time with voters who care about ECE and/or MNCS.
- 7. PROVIDING POLLING DATA: SCAN has commissioned extensive research on voter attitudes since its inception. Our data, the result of work from a bipartisan pair of nationally recognized political polling firms, is available upon request.
