
Don't feel wedded to this book list. If there is a book your team or your featured reader loves, read it!

Grace for President

By Kelly DiPucchio Reading Level: PreK-2 Number of Pages: 40


Description: Where are the girls? When Grace's teacher reveals that the United States has never had a female president, Grace decides to be the first. In this timely story, author Kelly DiPucchio not only gives readers a fun introduction to the American electoral system, but also teaches them the value of hard work, courage, and independent thought--and offers an inspiring example of how to choose our leaders.



Max for President

By Jarrett J. Krosoczka Reading Level: PreK-K, 1-2, 3-5 Number of Pages: 40

Description: Max thinks that he would like to be class president. So does Kelly. But there can only be one president. Who will the class elect? Full of laughs and suspense, Max for President is a lively story of good sportsmanship--and a great way for kids to learn a little about elections, too.



The Day Gogo Went to Vote

Description: Young Thembi accompanies her 100-year-old great-grandmother to the polling place in the first all-race elections in South Africa. Gogo is determined to vote and does so with a little help from her community. This story can help younger children understand the importance of the electoral process through its depiction of one woman anxious to vote for the first time in her life.

Drum Dream Girl: How One Girl's Courage Changed Music


By Margarita Engle Reading Level: PreK-3 Number of pages: 48

But when at last her dream-bright music was heard, everyone sang and danced and decided that both girls and boys should be free to drum and dream.


When Penny Met POTUS

Number of Pages: 32



The President of the Jungle

By André Rodrigues Reading Level: K-2 Number of Pages: 40

Description: Lion may be King of the jungle, but lately he only seems to care about himself. His subjects are fed up, so they decide to try something new-hold an election! In this fabulous and funny introduction to how elections work, the animals decide they are tired of their king and that it is time to vote for a president. This funny, non-partisan story features lively illustrations, a helpful glossary, and colorful characters who have an infectious enthusiasm for the election process.






Amelia Bedelia's First Vote

By Herman Parish Reading Level: PreK-2 Number of Pages: 32



Kids will learn about absentee ballots, runoffs, and the power of persuasion.

By Lane Smith Reading Level: 1-5 Number of Pages: 40



With deadpan wit and hilarious illustrations, best-selling picture book creator Lane Smith introduces readers to an unforgettable new character.



Lillian's Right to Vote: A Celebration of the Voting Rights Act of 1965

Description: As Lillian, a one-hundred-year-old African American woman, makes a "long haul up a steep hill" to her polling place, she sees more than trees and sky—she sees her family's history. This book vividly recall America's battle for civil rights in this lyrical, poignant account of one woman's fierce determination to make it up the hill and make her voice heard.





The Ballot Box Battle

By Emily Arnold McCully Reading Level: K-2 Number of Pages: 32

Description: On Election Day in 1880 Cordelia listens to her neighbor Mrs. Stanton tell the heart-wrenching story of her childhood. Charged with the story's message, Cordelia determines to go with Mrs. Stanton to the polls in an attempt to vote--above the jeers and taunts of the male crowd. With scenes brought to life by McCully's illustrations, Cordelia's turning-point experience is sure to inspire today's young girls (and boys) everywhere.
